Professor Hong LIU is the Tan Lark Sye Chair Professor of Public Policy and Global Affairs at the School of Social Sciences, Nanyang Technological University in Singapore, where he also serves as the University's Associate Vice President and Director (Research & Executive Education) of the Nanyang Centre for Public Administration (NCPA). He was previously Chair of the School of Humanities and Social Sciences (2011-2017), the School of Social Sciences (2017-2020), and Director of NCPA (2014-2022) at NTU. Prior to joining NTU, he was Founding Director and Chair Professor of the Centre for Chinese Studies at the University of Manchester and a tenured Associate Professor at the National University of Singapore.

Professor Liu's main areas of research include the international political economy, global history, Sino-Southeast Asian interactions, and Chinese international migration. He has published more than 25 books as well as over 100 articles including in leading international journals such as the *World Politics*, *Journal of Asian Studies*, *The China Quarterly*, *Journal of Contemporary China*, *Journal of Ethnic and Migration*, *Ethnic and Racial Studie*, and *Global Policy*. His recent publications include *Dear China: Emigrant Letters and Remittances, 1820-1980* (co-authored with Gregor Benton; University of California Press, 2018); *An Emerging Asian Model of Governance and Transnational Knowledge Transfer* (co-edited with Tingyan Wang, Routledge, 2020); *Changing Dynamics and Mechanisms of Maritime Asia in Comparative Perspective* (co-edited with Akita Shigeru and Shiro Momoki; Palgrave Macmillan, 2021); *The Political Economy of Transnational Governance: China and Southeast Asia in the 21st Century* (Routledge, 2022); and *The Making of Singapore as an Asian Regional Corridor: Historicity, Trade, and Diaspora* (coedited with Cheun Hoe Yow and Huimei Zhang; Routledge, forthcoming).

Professor Liu has been included in Stanford-Elsevier *World's Top 2% Scientists* for "Career Long Impact" and "Single Year Impact" (2024) in the fields of Social Sciences, Cultural Studies, Political Science and Public Administration, Sociology, and Economics.
